MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN

In 2003 Osgoode reinstated a practice of recording in an Annual Report the accomplishments and challenges met by the Law School during the previous year. Each Annual Report over the ensuing 10 years has served as a document of record, assisting to preserve the collective institutional memory of the Law School.

The 2012-13 Osgoode Annual Report, which covers the **fiscal period from May 1, 2012 to April 30, 2013**, is no exception. Indeed, it is arguably our best attempt to date to capture our achievements in a more concise and methodical way, using data that can be compared year over year.

This annual report, which was prepared with input from the Officers of the Law School, showcases the successes Osgoode is having in implementing its 2011-16 Strategic Plan, which calls for increased emphasis on experiential education and the exploration of law in action, intensification of research that shapes the public debate, and greater community engagement.

Among the Osgoode highlights of 2012-13 were the following:

- The Law School embarked on a bold change to its three-year Juris Doctor (JD) program. Commencing with the Class of 2015, which arrived in September 2012, every Osgoode JD student will be exposed to law in action through an experiential course or program as part of their legal education. Osgoode is the first law school in Canada to introduce an experiential education requirement - what we refer to as a **"praxicum"** - into the JD curriculum.
- The Law School also opened an **Office of Experiential Education** under the direction of Kimberley Bonnar '09, Manager, Experiential Education and Career Development. The Office of Experiential Education will serve as a catalyst for the development of new courses, programs and clinics, and provide support to faculty, students and staff.

Osgoode has been a leader in experiential education over several decades. Its experiential education offerings are the most extensive in Canada and among the most innovative in the world. In 2011-12, the Law School was proud to introduce new intensive programs in anti-discrimination law and intellectual property. In 2013-14, our new intensive program in disability law will be launched (in collaboration with ARCH).

- To address the mental health and wellness needs of our students, the Law School created the position of **Student Success and Wellness Counsellor** and hired alumna Melanie Banka Goela '03, who also holds a master's degree in counselling psychology. Banka Goela provided confidential support services to 105 students - about 12 per cent of the student body - who experienced difficulties during the 2012-13 academic year. She also helped to develop wellness programming including the School's inaugural Mental Health Awareness Week in November 2012.
- Banka Goela was also instrumental in helping to secure Ontario Ministry of Training, Colleges & Universities funding of \$92,606 over two years so Osgoode can work with five other Ontario law schools to develop and implement **mental health supports and resources** for Ontario's 4,100 law students and future lawyers.
- Osgoode Professors **Benjamin Berger** (law and religion), **Jinyan Li** (tax law) and **Poonam Puri** (securities law) each received substantial Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC) grants for important research projects.

- The Graduate Program in Law instituted a **pilot project** in 2012-13 of admitting judges, senior practitioners and other professionals on a part-time basis to the PhD Program in an effort to better serve the larger community.
- A fundraising campaign, which currently stands at \$2 million raised, was launched in 2012-13 in support of the development of the **Winkler Institute for Dispute Resolution** and the Winkler Chair in Dispute Resolution to be housed at Osgoode. The Institute, named in honour of retiring Ontario Chief Justice Warren K. Winkler (LLB '62, LLM '64, LLD '12), will be the only centre of its kind in Canada focused on pursuing new ideas, practices, research and innovation in dispute resolution. Its launch will coincide with Chief Justice Winkler's retirement from the Bench in December 2013.
- The Black Law Students' Association (BLSA) at Osgoode helped to create an important new Law School award: **The Honourable Lincoln Alexander '53 Award**. Alexander was the first black member of Canada's Parliament and the 24th Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. The inaugural award was presented to Mr. Justice Michael Tulloch '89 on February 11, 2013 as part of Black History Month celebrations.
- Visual artist **Cindy Blažević** was named Osgoode's inaugural **Artist in Residence**. She will work with a group of Osgoode students to obtain access to Kingston Penitentiary on the eve of its closing, scheduled to happen in April 2014, in order to photograph its interior spaces emptied of prisoners. The visual narrative of the photographs will be accompanied by a legal narrative comprised of the perspectives of those whose lives are intertwined with the prison such as judges, prosecutors, defence lawyers, prison officials and former inmates.
- **David Lepofsky '79**, a lawyer and community advocate; **Jeffery Hewitt '96**, general counsel to Chippewas of Rama First Nation; **Ronda Bessner**, a former senior legal analyst at five public inquiries; and **Mark Freiman**, a partner with Lerner LLP and former Deputy Attorney General of Ontario, were appointed **McMurtry Visiting Clinical Fellows** at Osgoode for 2013-14.
- Osgoode ended the fiscal year with an **in-year surplus**, due in large part to the superb performance of Osgoode Professional Development (OPD). OPD continues to offer innovative and high quality Professional LLM programs, Continuing Professional Development programs and added a number of new and successful Certificate programs in 2012-13. These surplus funds go to key Law School priorities including Accessibility, Experiential Education, Research Intensification and Infrastructure Renewal.

ADMISSIONS & STUDENT SERVICES (JD)

Osgoode's three-year Juris Doctor (JD) Program provides a rich, innovative and interdisciplinary experience that exposes students to a broad array of perspectives. Theory is integrated with practice throughout the curriculum so students can build upon a solid foundation in legal reasoning with hands-on experience in putting that reasoning to work.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Introduction of an experiential education requirement - referred to as a **"praxicum"** - into the JD curriculum and creation of Canada's first and only Office of Experiential Education under the direction of Kimberley Bonnar '09, Manager, Experiential Education and Career Development. Commencing with the Class of 2015, which arrived in September 2012, every JD student will be exposed to law in action through an experiential course or program as part of their legal education. The Office of Experiential Education will serve as a catalyst for the development of new courses, programs and clinics and provide support to faculty, students and staff.
- Creation of the **Student Success and Wellness Counsellor** position. Osgoode graduate Melanie Banka Goela '03, who also holds a master's degree in counselling psychology, was hired as the Law School's first Student Success and Wellness Counsellor. In her first year in this new position, Banka Goela provided confidential support services to 105 students - about 12 per cent of the student body - who experienced difficulties during the 2012-13 academic year. She also helped to develop wellness programming at the Law School such as mindfulness sessions, yoga classes and the inaugural Mental Health Awareness Week from November 19 to 21, 2012, which provided students with information regarding various mental health and wellness resources.
- Creation and administration of the **Accessibility Fund** to enhance accessibility of a legal education, with funds going toward student financial services (bursaries, the Wendy Babcock Social Justice Awards, Adjunct RA program, free LSAT Prep Course)
- Consolidation of student supports into the Office of Admissions & Student Services
- On July 1, 2012, the Recruitment, Admissions and Career Development divisions, along with the Programs & Records and Student Financial Services divisions, united to become the **Office of Admissions & Student Services**. Mya Bulwa became the Assistant Dean, Students, with responsibility for all of these divisions. The new structure is intended to enhance the ability of Osgoode staff to meet the needs of our students and programs. Implementation of online course evaluation system. In 2012-13, Osgoode moved to an online course evaluation system. After years of working with paper forms, the new online system allows students to easily complete the evaluation form and provide valuable feedback to their instructors and future students. The online system enables instructors and administrators to easily and remotely access the results in a timely manner.

STUDENT SUCCESS AND WELLNESS

This was the first year of operation of the new Student Success and Wellness office under the direction of Counsellor Melanie Banka Goela. It has proved to be a valuable service, as was demonstrated by the number of contacts. A total of 105 JD students, approximately 12% of the JD student body, contacted the Counsellor. Approximately 50% of these students were first-year students with the remainder being relatively equally split among upper-years.

The main presenting issues included anxiety, depression, and relationship challenges/breakdown and the intersections between these and students' academic/educational experience.

In terms of satisfaction and impact, all of the users of the service were asked to complete an anonymous multiple-choice survey. There was a 50% response rate. Of those who responded, 99% indicated that they found the individual counselling services helpful.

GRADUATE STUDIES PROGRAM IN LAW

The Graduate Studies Program has achieved an international reputation for its excellence and rigour and for the quality and diversity of its graduates. It is the largest LLM/PhD Program in Canada, and has the largest cohort of PhD students in North America. Scholarship and creativity are integral to the Graduate Studies Program. Students undertake research that advances critical inquiry and influences social and cultural developments in Canada and abroad.

The Graduate Studies Program at Osgoode is unique in its focus on Study Groups. This year, students read widely on Law and Economic Relations, Regulation and Governance, Law and Social Justice, and Law in a Global Context. The Study Groups, along with the Graduate Seminar and several workshops on methodology, created a strong intellectual community for students.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Enrolments have stabilized from their previously very high levels. This year, a pilot project was instituted of admitting judges, senior practitioners and other professionals on a part-time basis to the PhD Program in an effort to better serve the larger community.
- The **Annual Graduate Student Conference** was a resounding success, attracting more than 75 students from many universities, involving faculty members on panels and as discussants, and giving students the opportunity to showcase their research.
- Five students participated in the **Atlas/Agora**, a special offering by an international consortium of prestigious graduate schools in law. Many students gave papers at academic conferences around the world, including in England, India, Prague and the Netherlands. Participation was supported in part by \$17,500 in funding.
- Five students secured **academic positions** at universities in Canada and elsewhere.
- Jeannine Woodall was hired as Director, Research and Graduate Studies Operations.
- The scheduled Program Cyclical Review was postponed until 2013-14 to give the incoming Graduate Program Director time to develop strategies for the future.
- The application guide and the various student handbooks are being revised. Seven **“Information Bulletins”** have been distributed to students and their supervisors. For example, they deal with strategies for job interviews, critical reviews of the literature and preparation for the dissertation outline examination. A pocket guide for faculty members is being created. A new recruitment strategy is being put into place.
- The new Graduate Student Lounge, study carrels and additional computing facilities enriched the resources for students.

OSGOODE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

HIGHLIGHTS

- Developed the new **LLM in Canadian Common Law** to commence in the Fall of 2013; high demand required applications to be cut off at 89
- Added several successful **non-credit certificate programs** to the growing roster of specialized certificates
- Continued to improve **technology** including the implementation of a new webcasting system, a learning management system, development of Web-based e-commerce, and development of a new Website scheduled to launch in summer 2013
- Entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Australian National University to share knowledge and technology on various professional legal education projects
- Exceeded budgeted **financial targets**

PROFESSIONAL LLM

- 164 new students enrolled
- Total enrollment was 839 students of which 333 were remote learners
- 22 students were enrolled in the LLM in International Business Law from countries including Germany, Bahrain, Nigeria, China and Finland
- The following new courses were offered (bringing the total number of Professional LLM courses to more than 120):
 - Competition Law & Policy
 - Securities Regulation for Business Law Students
 - Public Utility Law
 - Demand Side Management: Policy & Regulation
- Launched “single course enrollment,” which gives students the opportunity to try out an LLM course before committing to the full-degree program
- Continued to expand “rolling admission,” which provides students with the opportunity to start specializations at multiple entry points

NON- CREDIT CONTINUING LEGAL EDUCATION

- 3,243 delegates attended one and two -day programs
- Programs included Search and Seizure Law (Banff); Mental Health Law for Children; Child and Spousal Support; Ethics in Negotiation; Lobbying, Government Relations & Ethics; Aboriginal Criminal Justice Post-Gladue and Ipeelee
- 672 delegates attended 5 or 6 day Certificate Programs; a total of 22 certificate programs were offered
- 668 individuals participated in lunch-hour webinars
- Newly launched certificate programs included Entertainment Law & Practice; Workplace Health & Safety Compliance; Regulatory Compliance for Financial Institutions; eDiscovery, Records Management, Information Governance and Privacy; Personal Injury Law and Practice and Negotiation for Lawyers
- Custom programs were delivered to various organizations including the Ontario Securities Commission, Canada Post, Office of the Ontario Coroner, the Government of Nunavut, and the Ministry of Justice (BC)
- Several programs were delivered in partnership with other organizations including the Human Resources Professionals Association, Yukon College, the Society of Ontario Adjudicators and Regulators, International Property Tax Institute, the Caribbean Procurement Institute, and The Advocates' Society
- New partnerships were established to deliver programs in the Fall of 2013, including a certificate with the Forum of Canadian Ombudsmen and for various programs in Calgary with the University of Calgary Faculty of Law

LIBRARY

The Library had another productive 12 months in the 2012-13 academic year, the second in its new quarters in the renovated Law School building. The library facilities are proving a great success and students continue to be pleased with them. At the same time, the Library continues to be challenged by the unsettled state of paper-to-digital scholarly publishing and our desire to fulfill changing user expectations as information technologies continue to evolve, while maintaining our position as the “go to” research collection for law in Canada. Many of these tensions - and the opportunities they present - are reflected in the list of our accomplishments for the year.

HIGHLIGHTS

- The Library adopted a new **Collection Development Policy** in February 2013. Developed with substantial input from the School’s Library Committee, the new policy recognizes both existing and developing areas of topical and material strengths in the Library’s collections. For the first time, it also establishes a significant role for digital resources and is reflective of our current understanding of the balance between print and digital in contemporary Canadian legal scholarship and practice. Though the policy is only a general guide to our practices, we hope that sharing it will contribute to a better understanding of our collections and our role as a resource for all Canadians.
- The Library was the venue for a special **historical photography exhibit** *The Face of the Ghetto: Pictures Taken by Jewish Photographers in the Lodz Ghetto, 1940-1944*, held February 24-March 17, 2013. The exhibition was first shown in North America at the United Nations in New York from January to March 2012 and then toured to several other American venues. The Osgoode showing - its only showing in Canada - was sponsored by the Israel and Golda Koschitzky Centre for Jewish Studies at York University, The Azrieli Foundation; and The Mark and Gail Appel Program in Holocaust and Antiracism Education - Learning from the Past, Teaching for the Future. The exhibition was curated and provided by the Topography of Terror Foundation (Stiftung Topographie des Terrors), Berlin, with support from the Foreign Office of the Federal Republic of Germany. The exhibition featured 56 enlarged photographic prints, accompanied by quotations from survivor reports and from the chronicle of the ghetto serving as captions. The decision to host the exhibit in the Library was a reflection not only of the versatility of our new Library design, but also of our commitment to offering opportunities to our students to engage with information in all its forms.
- We continue to expand our activities in the increasingly important areas of preserving our older print holdings and enhancing access to them through digitization. Working with William S. Hein & Co., Inc. (HeinOnline), we completed a project to digitize the complete **Revised Statutes of Canada**, beginning with the first revision in 1896 through to the last revision in 1985. We are especially proud of this project because now, for the first time ever, the Revised Statutes of Canada are available online.
- As part of our ongoing commitment to digital collections generally, to developing resources in foreign, international and comparative law, and an ongoing commitment to resources for legal history, we acquired the new Module 7 of *The Making of Modern Law: Foreign Primary Sources, 1600-1970* from Gale Digital Collections, complementing Module 6 (Foreign, Comparative and International Law, 1600-1926), which we acquired last year. Other significant digital acquisitions included the *American Indian Law Collection* and *World Trials Library*, both from HeinOnline.

- As stewards of the largest law library in Canada, with an internationally significant collection of early Anglo-American law books and the largest collection of legal Canadiana anywhere, we consider it an obligation to preserve these materials as a resource for all Canadians. As an extension to this self-imposed obligation, we have taken on permanent deposit the collections of old and rare law books and law reports from the Judges' Library in "old" Osgoode Hall and from the Library of the Toronto Lawyers Association. Our promise to these libraries is that, while they retain ownership in these collections, we will preserve their increasingly fragile collections in our **Canada Law Book Rare Book Room** in perpetuity. These are just the first in what we hope will be models of collaboration between Osgoode and other libraries throughout the legal arena in Toronto and Ontario.
- As the decoration of the new Library space evolves and as part of the continuing program to bring art into the Law School, a large painting was installed on the wall of the Library's signature staircase. The **trptych**, from York University's permanent collection, is by Japanese-Canadian artist Roy Kiyooka . Entitled "Homage to Ben Nicholson," it dates from the artist's three-dimensional or "low relief" abstract period in the mid-1960s (contemporary with Osgoode's move to York University).
- The Library's blog *Off the Shelf* was awarded the **2012 "Clawbie"** (Canadian Law Blog) award for best Canadian law school library blog.
- The Library's four full-time professional librarians (Yemisi Dina, Tim Knight, Daniel Perlin and Sharon Wang) were promoted to **tenured** continuing appointments at York University, with the status of Associate Librarians.

Guest speakers included representatives from all levels of government, the technology and pharmaceutical industries, tech transfer offices, and academia.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES (ITS)

HIGHLIGHTS

- MyJD - Developed this application, which provides automated tracking of degree requirements for students to graduate. **MyJD** is a key component of the Law School's Business Process Improvement initiative.
- Implemented secure printing and scanning with the purchase of new Ricoh **copiers**, in addition to allowing print jobs to be released from any copier, eliminating the need to re-send print jobs due to malfunctioning equipment.
- Partnered with UIT to provision and maintain student lab space and partnered with ITC to provide support for classroom technologies.
- Using a Social Collaboration Tool - **IBM Connections** - for all Helpdesk knowledge -based documentation and processes. This allows the Helpdesk to provide more efficient service to clients, while keeping track of programs (e-exams, lecture capture, electronic classroom support).
- A key step in the E-Learning initiative was to bring Moodle - Course Management System - online this year and migrate over half of the Osgoode faculty onto the new system.
- Supported **AODA** initiatives - adaptive software, course websites, hardware setup (braille printer, scanner). Also supported York's PCI-DSS initiatives, as of December 2012 Osgoode is fully PCI-DSS Compliant.
- Osgoode ITS currently blocks 97.94% of all incoming e-mail - marked as spam.
- The Helpdesk **laptop loaner program** assisted 60 members of the community, not including e-exam accommodations throughout the school year.
- There were a total of 12 video conferencing events (PhD defence, IP Osgoode, etc.) hosted from September to May.
- The Helpdesk resolved approximately 10,000 **service** tickets within the last year - over 40 tickets per day.

EXTERNAL RELATIONS & COMMUNICATIONS

HIGHLIGHTS

- Effective July 1, 2012, the Office of Advancement assumed an **expanded portfolio**, amalgamating with the Communications Office to become the Office of External Relations & Communications. This new combined approach to external relations and communications is designed to better promote and build resources for the Law School. The Office is responsible for the Law School's internal and external communications including media relations; social media; fundraising; alumni relations and programs; and event planning. Anita Herrmann, formerly Director of Advancement, was appointed Director, External Relations & Communications.
- In 2012-13, the Office provided support to the Black Law Students' Association (BLSA) in the creation of an important new Law School award: The Honourable Lincoln Alexander '53 Award. Alexander was the first black member of Canada's Parliament and the 24th Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. The **inaugural award** was presented to Mr. Justice Michael Tulloch '89 on February 11, 2013 as part of Black History Month celebrations. At the award presentation, which brought together a large number of alumni, the BLSA also recognized the leadership and contributions of retired judge George Carter '48; the late Leonard Braithwaite '58, who was the first black Canadian to be elected to the Ontario Legislature; and Margaret Best '95, MPP Scarborough-Guildwood.
- A **fundraising campaign** was launched in 2012-13 in support of the development of the Winkler Institute for Dispute Resolution and the Winkler Chair in Dispute Resolution to be housed at Osgoode. The Institute, which will be devoted to research and initiatives involving innovative dispute resolution, is named in honour of Ontario Chief Justice Warren K. Winkler (LLB '62, LLM '64, LLD '12), who has devoted his 50-year career as a labour lawyer and then a jurist to the improvement of both traditional and alternative methods of dispute resolution.
- In 2012-13, the Office of External Relations & Communications made greater use of its **social networking** sites, particularly Facebook, Twitter and LinkedIn, to share news and engage with followers. We closed our alumni Twitter account (@Osgoodealumni) in order to concentrate on @OsgoodeNews to promote the Law School. We also continued to use @OsgoodeStudents to engage with current students. By increasing the frequency of our tweeting on @OsgoodeNews and actively going after potential followers, we gained hundreds of followers on both Twitter and Facebook. Community engagement appears to be on the rise, judging by responses in the form of tweets, likes and hashtags.
- The Office, in consultation with the Dean, developed and implemented an **"Experience Osgoode"** awareness campaign that focused on the Law School's commitment to experiential legal education. An Experience Osgoode Website was created to showcase our students' engagement with various communities through participation in a broad array of clinical and intensive programs. In addition, a paid advertising campaign was conducted to enhance awareness of the Experience Osgoode Website and the School's experiential education programs. A series of Experience Osgoode ads, both print and digital, ran in the Toronto Star and in several legal publications (Law Times, Lawyers Weekly, Canadian Lawyer, Canadian Legal Newswire) from late September to early November.

BUDGET

The 2012-13 budget supported the core teaching, learning and research mission of the Law School. In keeping with the School's mission, this year saw some targeted funding set aside in the Flex Fund to advance the School's strategic objectives and capital funds were expended in an effort to enhance and upgrade the School's facilities and equipment.

In 2012-13, Osgoode ended the fiscal year with an in-year surplus. Osgoode Professional Development (OPD) contributed \$1,700,000 and Osgoode operating funds contributed \$866,000 toward the surplus. With this surplus, Osgoode continues to pay down its historical negative carry forward according to schedule (\$340,000/year) and transfer the remaining funds into the Flex Fund. The Flex Fund was first established with an initial transfer of \$1,600,000 in the 2011-12 fiscal year. This first transfer of funds assigned \$800,000 to a contingency fund and the other \$800,000 to support strategic initiatives. The funding to support strategic initiatives was allocated as follows:

- \$200,000 for an **Accessibility Fund** to enhance accessibility of a legal education;
- \$150,000 for an **Experiential Education Fund** to expand and enhance experiential learning at Osgoode;
- \$150,000 for a **Research Intensification Fund** to enhance Osgoode's reputation as a leading research intensive law school; and
- \$300,000 for **OPD** to invest in IT infrastructure.

The \$2,600,000 surplus from 2012-13 will be directed as follows:

- \$600,000 will be applied to reduce the negative carry forward;
- \$1,000,000 will be added to the existing \$800K contingency fund; and
- \$1,000,000 will be directed to strategic initiatives. Some of these funds will support a new digital legal education initiative.

In 2012-13, investments made in facilities and equipment upgrades included:

- Audio/visual equipment upgrades to Moot Court;
- Purchase of display cabinets for trophies and plaques won in student lawyering competitions;
- Purchase of new furniture for community-gathering spaces, such as the Faculty Common Room, Student Common Room, the Family Room and other lounges;
- Installation of computers in all of the study rooms in the Library;
- Purchase of a dais for the Paul B. Helliwell Centre for Innovation in Dispute Resolution; and
- Purchase of podium timers to support our Mooting Program.

Moving forward, the 2013-14 budget anticipates that OPD will again produce a surplus in the range of approximately \$1,400,000, while the Osgoode operating budget expects a surplus of approximately \$100,000. With the inclusion of the Flex Fund, the overall financial position of the School is anticipated to move into a positive balance by the end of the 2013-14 fiscal year for the first time in many years.
