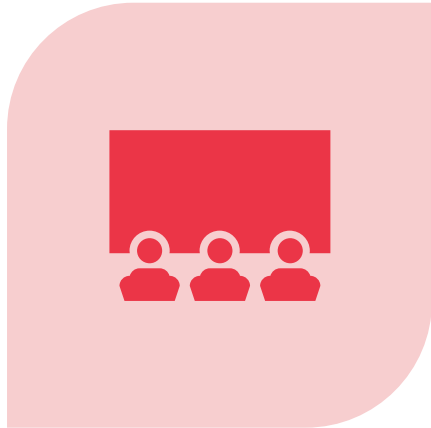

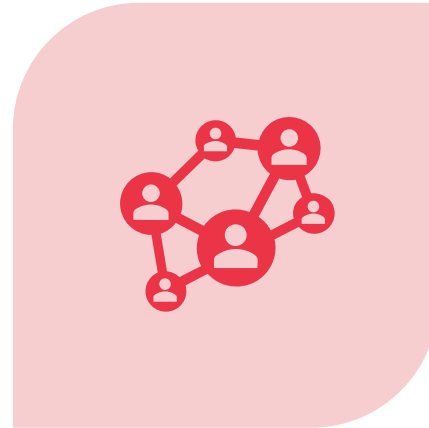

Research Mobilization and Research Visibility

RESEARCH MOBILIZATION (KNOWLEDGE MOBILIZATION)

- The [SSHRC](#) defines knowledge mobilization as: “an umbrella term encompassing a wide range of activities relating to the production and use of research results, including knowledge synthesis, dissemination, transfer, exchange, and co-creation or co-production by researchers and knowledge users.”

RESEARCH VISIBILITY

- Is the practice of making the research findings visible and discoverable to the scholarly community and the public using open and closed research platforms.
- Evidence of research activities can come in different formats: journal articles, conference papers, preprints, books and book chapter, recorded presentations or lectures, editorials, podcasts.

Research Mobilization and Research Visibility

Research mobilization is the process while research visibility can be seen as the practice.



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Research Visibility: Research Platforms

Research platform is a term that can be used to describe:

- Research databases such as Scopus and HeinOnline, Google Scholar.
- For-profit repositories such as Academia.edu and ResearchGate.
- Institutional repositories (usually non-profit) such as Osgoode Digital Commons.
- Preprint repositories such as SSRN.

Not all research databases are platforms and do not have author profiles (for instance, JSTOR). Different types of control and features vary between platforms.



Research Visibility: Author Profiles



An online author profile contains a list of the author publications and sometimes other scholarly outputs on a research database or academic networking platform.



Author profiles are expanding past listing publications to include funding grants, awards, professional activity and other non-academic publications (editorials, interviews, podcasts, patents, and more).

Research Visibility: Author Profiles

You may not even be aware you have an author profile!

Being aware and claiming your author profiles is important because:

1. They increase visibility and accessibility of your research output (multiple access points).
2. You're more likely to avoid having your work incorrectly attributed to the wrong person or institution.
3. They move where you move or if you change your name.
4. Provide metrics which can assist you when responding to research grant applications.
5. Having more than one profile is ideal.

Unique Author Identifiers: ORCID iD

Unique Author Identifiers is a numerical digital identifier that helps distinguish your work from other researchers with similar names.

Now typically used in manuscript submission processes, ORCID ID's can be embedded into metadata to permanently link an author with their research outputs.

Tips:

- If you have an ORCID ID – fill out your profile.
- Include your ORCID ID on your email signature.
- Make sure when available to include your ORCID number in manuscript submissions.

Bonus Tip:

- The ODC can now display linked ORCID numbers on the article level page.

Abstract

Actors in international law are presumed to be states. Yet in the international economic law arena, the corporation is one of the most prominent non-state actors. Indeed, in some instances, the corporation may even be more influential than the state in some arenas of international economic law. This short piece examines three instances of this influence. First, it looks at the role of corporations in law-making; second, it examines corporations' role in monitoring and compliance; and, third, it explores corporations' legal personality in international economic law. Finding corporations' immense influence on law-making and monitoring and compliance, combined with a robust legal personality, this piece concludes that not only are corporations actors in international economic law, but they are also part of the framework of global governance in the area.

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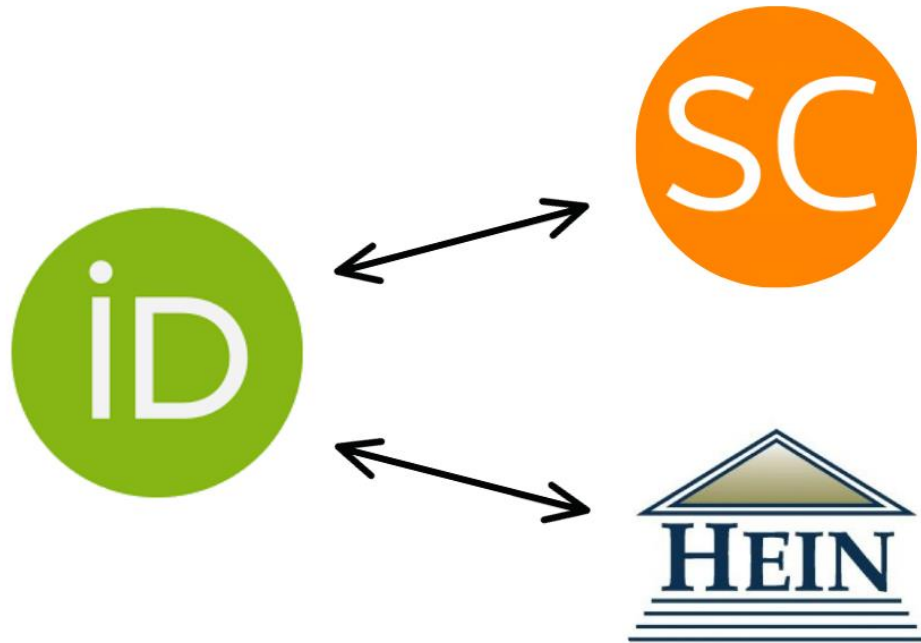
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Research Platforms: What to post and where?



ORCID


- Increasingly used by aggregators and index databases. Meaning it can provide direct and reliable links to your research profiles and publications, such as the Scopus Author Identifier and HeinOnline Author Profile.
- Can showcase more than just publications
- Is integrable with the Canadian Common CV (CCV) research management system used by the Tri-Agencies, thereby reducing manual data entry and minimizing administrative burden on faculty.
- Disambiguates researchers with common names.

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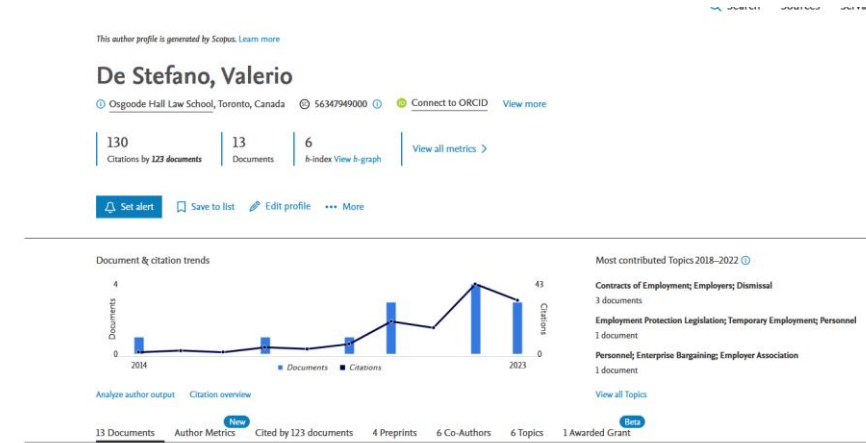
SSRN

- A preprint repository used to post unpublished or forthcoming work for a faster publication process
- Author Profile and Author ID is created once you submit your article and it has been accepted. (Send them into ODC!)
- Metrics include usage data (article views and downloads) and other article-level metrics (Citations and PlumX Metrics).
- Full text papers are indexed by Google Scholar and displays linked ORCID iD.
- Connect with other scholars and their work.

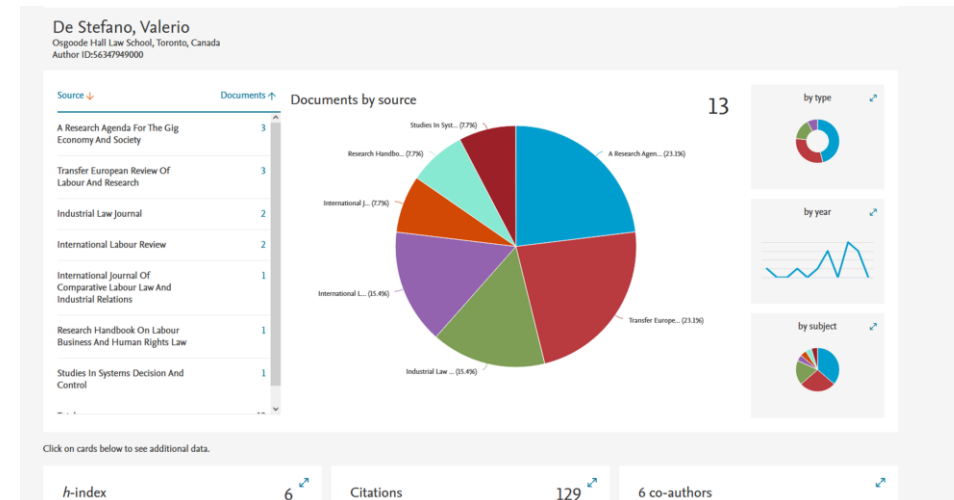
Research Platforms: What to post and where?

Scopus

- Automatically generated.
- Author profile data comes from Journals, articles and books in its index – updated daily.
- Citation metrics are more sophisticated than the other platforms. Provides data visualization for author and article level
- Connects to ORCID ID.
- Prone to ‘fragmented profiles’.

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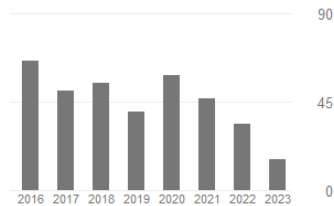

Abstract

A marked feature of the contemporary U.S. constitutional landscape is the campaign by an Evangelical-Catholic coalition against the idea of secularism, understood by this alliance to mean the exclusion of religion from the state and its progressive marginalization from social life. Departing from the tendency to treat this project as a national phenomenon, this article places it within a longer global genealogy of an earlier international Christian ecumenical effort to combat secularism. The triumph of that campaign culminated in the making of Article 18 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, now considered the paradigmatic international legal provision on religious liberty. Article 18's protection of the rights to proselytize and convert, I argue, was a product of an impassioned contestation between an ecumenical movement keen on securing the prerogative to spread the gospel to the non-Christian world and a secularism in a strange alliance with Islam in the region that held the greatest promise for the evangelical enterprise—Muslim Africa. In excavating the genealogy of ecumenical thought as it developed a critique of the so-called secularist threat, I recover the delicate links between the contemporary U.S. anti-secular campaign and the earlier ecumenical efforts.


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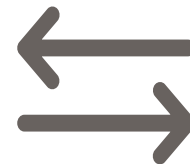
